

Comprehensive Plan Update

County Agricultural Development Councils have the responsibility to evaluate the needs of the local agricultural economy. The updated County Comprehensive Plan should identify programs and projects best suited for agricultural development fund investments in the County.

The Governor's Office of Agricultural Policy staff may provide guidance to county councils throughout this evaluation.

1. Overview of County

Fayette County was and continues to be very dependent on tobacco income. The county has made great strides in last five years to lessen dependency on tobacco.

2. Assessments of the County

a. Strengths

Fayette County is a very fast growing community in Kentucky. Our major strength is our signature Equine Industry. We are very fortunate to have Keeneland and Kentucky Horse Park both located in our County. The support from industries such as veterinary medicine, banking, insurance and farm supply companies allows our county to have a very strong agriculture industry and economy. We also have the largest cattle market east of the Mississippi River which leads to a highly competitive and strong cattle market. A large population base with higher income and an interest in knowing where their food comes from has provided more opportunity for value-added products for farmers in Fayette County.

b. Weaknesses

The high value of land in Fayette County makes it very difficult for farmers to expand. Land availability is a major problem for producers in Fayette County. The urban population does not always understand the economic importance of agriculture production in Fayette County and the state of Kentucky.

c. Opportunities

Local value-added food production, livestock diversification, and crop diversification, and hemp production offer opportunities for growth in future. Agri-tourism is another area where we are seeing many economical opportunities for farmers.

d. Challenges

The average age of farmers in Fayette County is approaching 60 years of age. The increased cost of land and equipment make it very difficult for young farmers trying to get started farming.

3. County Council Objectives

a. Mission/Vision Statement

The Fayette County Agriculture Development Council will recommend investments of money from the Agriculture Development Fund for projects which provide the potential to increase net farm income and positively affect farm families and the communities in which they live.

b. Short term goals

With Fayette County being a large producer of equine and having very high quality soils, livestock and forage/crop production provide the greatest opportunities to improve farm income for the largest number of farms in the county. Projects that can increase income by adding production, cutting costs, expanding markets, adding value or developing new enterprises will be given a high priority. Non-traditional agricultural related enterprises can offer opportunities for new and emerging crops. Sound proposals in these areas will be looked at and evaluated closely. Lack of knowledge and experience is a limiting factor that keeps many farmers from exploring alternative crops.

c. Long term goals

Improving knowledge base and confidence that will allow our farmers to reduce dependence upon tobacco income and expand farm income is the ultimate objective for all projects to be approved. Those proposals that can show real and significant income potential with viable marketing opportunities and offer long range income for farm families will be most favorably looked upon for approval.

d. Tactics for leveraging funds

Regional partnerships

Proposals that involve cost share must meet state guidelines to be awarded. The Fayette County Agriculture Development Council is very open to partnering with surrounding counties in the Central Bluegrass Area in ways that will support current agriculture or emerging agriculture production.

State Agricultural Development Board resources

The GOAP staff has developed 10 investment area programs that enable County Councils to cost share to farm families who score high enough on the statewide producer questionnaire.
