1. Overview of County

2017 Census of Agriculture data shows a total of 499 farms: a decline of 1 farm since 2012. Total agriculture product sales for corn, soybeans, cattle and poultry total \$144,882,000.00. Poultry sales account for 57.7%, Corn and Soybean sales account for 36% and beef cattle accounty for 4.5%. Tobacco production has declined since the buyout; but significantly less over the past 3 years.
